- (1) Malala Yousafzai, the Pakistani teenage education campaigner who was shot in the head by a Taliban gunman on school bus in 2012, has won the 2014 Nobel peace prize. Malala won the prize along with Kailash Satyarthi, an Indian children's rights activist.
- (2) Speaking after finishing the school day at Edgbaston High School for Girls, in Birmingham, Malala said: "My message to children all around the world is that they should stand up for their rights." She added: "I felt more powerful and more courageous because an award is not just a piece of metal or a medal you wear or an award you keep in your room. "This is an encouragement for me to go forward."
- (3) Malala, now 17, was shot two years ago in Pakistan after coming to prominence for her campaigning for education for girls.

 After being shot she was airlifted to Queen Elizabeth hospital in Birmingham, where she was treated for life-threatening injuries. She has since continued to campaign for girls' education, speaking before the UN, meeting Barack Obama, being named one of Time magazine's 100 most influential people and last year publishing the memoir I am Malala.

 Last month a gang of 10 Taliban fighters who tried to kill her were arrested, the Pakistan army claimed.
- (4) In a statement, the Nobel committee said: "Despite her youth, Malala Yousafzai has already fought for several years for the right of girls to education, and has shown by example that children and young people, too, can contribute to improve <u>their</u> own situations. Through her heroic struggle she has become a leading spokesperson for girls' rights to education."
