I. READING COMPREHENSION

1. A test that tells you how long you will live for is to go on sale in Britain this year. The £435 blood test will offer the alluring possibility of estimating your lifespan. Some scientists said the test could also provide insights into a range of age-related disorders like Alzheimer's and cancer. Others, however, have already raised questions about ethical issues.

2. Researchers working on the technology said they would be able to read a person's 'biological age' by the length of structures on the ends of a person's chromosomes, called telomeres. They believe telomeres are an important indicator of the speed at which a person is ageing. Several studies have indicated that individuals with shorter telomeres are likely to die younger than those with longer ones. Yet, the test cannot predict the exact number of years a person has to live.

3. Critics argue that the controversial new technology opens the way for insurance companies to demand tests before offering a policy. Dr Maria Blasco, the inventor of the commercial test, said: "We know that people who are born with shorter telomeres than normal have a shorter lifespan. Yet, we don't know whether longer telomeres give you a longer lifespan". She added that the test was simple and fast. Professor Von Zglinicki, an expert in the field, however, stipulated that telomere length might be good to compare groups, but by no means would it inform about an individual's health. He is also worried that companies trying to market fake elixirs of life may hijack the test. "Putting this on the market is premature", he maintained.

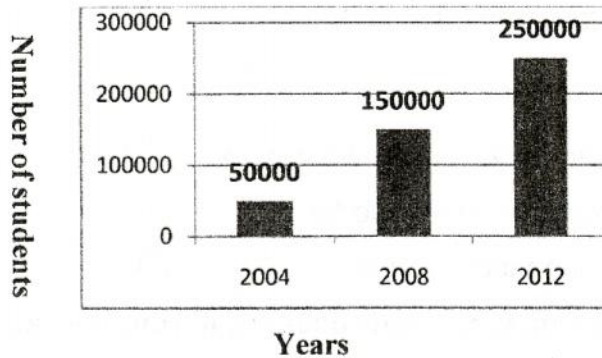
